**Feedback Obtained**

We follow the following feedback system which is the existing practice of the Vidyapeeth. Student feedback For the academic year 2019-20 , students' feedback is sought from students.,about the curriculum and teaching learning process. Majority of the student population (61) agreed that the syllabus is very much challenging .and the learning value of the courses is very good.. Majority of the students (90) strongly agreed that the syllabus is covered by the teachers on time. About 60 students agree that the learning value of courses are very good.. It is observed that 70 of the respondents agreed that the courses are in tune with their respective field of specialization.. Majority of students (90) agree that all teachers have very good subject knowledge and communication skill as well. Teachers Feedback Majority of the teachers agreed that that syllabus is framed with major focus on necessary technical skills and knowledge. required for their respective fields... 80 of them noted that they have full freedom to adopt new teaching strategies to enable the students for deep insight and practical orientation of syllabus.Also they noted that they have scope to suggest and implement innovative exam reforms.70 teachers agree that university provides adequate and satisfactory ICT facilities . Feedback from Parents Feedback obtained from the parents is considered as vital for the development of any educational institution.. Majority of 70.7 of the parents expressed that the simplicity and fairness of the admission procedure of the University is excellent. Academic discipline in terms of timely conduct of lectures, practical and other activities is highly appreciated by them. Majority of the parents felt that quality of the teaching and training provided at the institution and its contribution to their wards overall personality development as excellent. 99 parents are satisfied that the institution is able to maintain a fair balance between academics and co-curricular activities.. Majority of parents noted that the library ,hostel and recreation hall is good facility provided by university. Alumni feedback The contribution of alumni to the activities of the University is substantial especially in the development of the curriculum. The feedback from the alumni reveals that 100 of them feel proud to be a part of the institution which have a great legacy of 100 years.and are willing to contribute to the development of the institution. Majority of alumni (63.7) rated the developmental activities rendered by the University for their overall development as highly efficient. Regarding the residential facilities, 90 of them who were in hostel rated that the food and accommodation facilities as highly efficient. It was reported by the 100 of the respondents that they feel that adequate knowledge was gained during their course of study and the knowledge gained in the institution is relevant to the current jobs they are holding. Many alumni has given suggestion to guide them

and current students for competitive exams in their respective fields.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

New journals, magazines, books and online database are procured and made available to the faculty and students. Remote access to e-resources of library is available. Smart card facility has been launched by the Library for its users. Regular subscriptions are paid for accessing National and International e-journals. All the classrooms are equipped with ICT facilities. Infrastructure facilities for Divyangjan like ramps, elevators with Braille keyboard are available. Well equipped Laboratories with modern techniques are made available to the students and research scholars. Campus is Wi-fi enabled. Network security system has been implemented. Research and Development

All the research activities of the Vidyapeeth are carried out by Lokmanya Tilak Research Development Centre. Faculties are encouraged to apply for various research grants from Government and Non-Government agencies. Financial assistance is provided to faculty members for publishing their research papers in various National / International journals and to present their work in National/International Conferences. Various research workshops and training programs are arranged from time to time.

To facilitate functional Teaching-Learning Process, at the beginning of the academic year, the faculty of the Vidyapeeth prepare the Academic Calendar and academic plan. Vidyapeeth pays intensive attention to its teaching and learning process to provide quality education. Apart from conventional teaching techniques, the faculty members are motivated to utilize e-learning resources, Information and Communication Technology (ICT), Open Educational Resources etc. for effective teaching. Continuous assessment of students is done through assignment, class tests and tutorials. Continuous assessment mechanism helps the teachers to identify the advanced and slow learners. The slow learners, if any, are given remedial coaching. The Vidyapeeth has a well maintained Mentor:Mentee Ratio. The Mentors offer parental care to the Mentee and undertake to offer guidance, support and counselling wherever necessary. Various teaching methods adopted helps all round personality development of the students. The Vidyapeeth has well defined program wise and course wise learning outcomes, which are displayed on the Vidyapeeth's website.

Curriculum Development

To adapt with the new and emerging technologies in the respective fields, the curriculum undergoes revision from time to time. The curriculum is revised based on the stakeholder's feedback. Draft curriculum is discussed in the Board of Studies and placed before the Academic Council and finally approved by the Board of Management. Then the curriculum is effectively imparted to the students with the support of the faculty. Each Department of the Vidyapeeth has its well defined

academic calendar. The Vidyapeeth has active Cells to interact with the industries and research bodies.
